
Early morning on a rainy Saturday. The men drink coffee and talk about what else needs to be set up. Most of it was done last night.



Registration table is about set.




Welcome packs are ready and the crowd pours in like the rain that was falling outside. About 68 people attended.

Dick brought the NMRA's presentation layout which was built by Editor Steven Priest's son. Nice layout!




The town and details on the track are quite amazing for such a small layout.

Everyone was talking trains. I was able to meet a lot of new people and make friends.




The table talk was invigorating. I event got a volunteer to let me use their chop saw for a day!
