In February, we visited Seth Gartner and his New York Central, Cleveland Division, Piney Fork Branch which covers his hometown of Minerva, Ohio. The 3 level HO scale layout covers approximately 420 square feet of a large basement. During the visit, we ran an operating session using train orders and timetable. Railroad Modeling University 2018

Railroad Modeling University (RMU) 2018 is complete. This is our twelfth anniversary. The Carolina Southern Division of the NMRA is proud to continue this annual tradition.

The weather cooperated on January 27 no freezing rain and snow. We had over 60 people signed up for twenty-six classes. Classes ranged from **Basic Model Railroading** to **Light, Sound & Motion Animation for Model Railroads** to **Tips and Tricks from a MMR**.

We were actually one week later than normal (usually the 3rd weekend) due to the Train Show in Charlotte earlier in January. We passed out RMU flyers at the show and nabbed a good number of attendees for RMU.

Here are a few excerpts from the welcome letter we included in each student packet:

RMU is a place to discover the fun of model railroading. Master Model Railroaders (MMRs in the National Model Railroad Association) and other experienced model railroader's conduct clinics (short classes in 'university speak') and hold demonstrations (labwork in 'university speak') about the various aspects of model railroading.

Our mission is simple:

To provide a venue where modelers, from beginners to experts:

- 1. Are introduced to new concepts and techniques which will assist them in taking their layouts and models to a higher level.*
- 2. Meet fellow modelers who will become friends and mentors. RMU is a great opportunity to learn something new and meet other model railroaders.*

Twelve years ago The Carolina Southern Division of the NMRA had a dream to offer an opportunity for model railroader's to come together and share information, expertise and idea's. Without you this dream would never be successful.

We continued to use Christ the King church in south Charlotte as the venue. With the increase in the number of classes we added four class periods in the Multi-Purpose room (MPR).

The rooms are more intimate that a regular classroom. Many attendees told me they were better able to see and hear the instructor. Since these were Sunday School rooms and not a high school classroom we did not have audio-visual equipment for use which is a drawback.

Speaking of instructors, a huge Thank You to each of our instructors. Without you Railroad Modeling University could not exist. The students were appreciative of the knowledge and expertise each instructor displayed. Our Division benefits from having the instructors volunteering their time and sharing their talents at Railroad Modeling University. The depth, breadth and variety of model and real railroading knowledge is truly exceptional in our Division.

Other comments from students are:

- Great audience engagement by going around the room.
- Very knowledgeable with lots of great tips.
- I appreciated that all the clinics I attended provided handouts. This made my note taking and recall of the topic much easier and more beneficial.
- Need more time.

Railroad Modeling University is a team effort. Thank you to everyone who helped in any way to make Railroad Modeling University 2018 a success.


Figure 4 Roy Becker's Reversing Loops Class












