## A BACKDROP ON THE FLY

Tewfork Newfayen and Lartford

My layout lives in our dining room as our farmhouse built in 1905 has no basement. The room has a bank of five windows facing an enclosed area that our dogs run around in. I wanted to be able to keep an eye on them, and also enjoy the view and light provided by the windows. I also wanted to have a backdrop with a city scene of buildings representing the area behind South Station in Boston Mass. So, what to do? I have a background in technical theatre, and after remembering hoisting backdrops up and down for numerous productions, I figured why not make a movable backdrop for my railroad.

I wanted to have something with substance to it but also be thin. I could have made a lightweight wooden frame with canvas material stretched over it, but that's an added expense for the material. I already had 1/8" hardboard in stock so I used that. Measuring the space I was willing to sacrifice at the top of the window and still have a good view, I came up with 17" for the height of the backdrop which would still give me enough for photographs of the scenery. I cut an 8ft X 17" piece of the hardboard, and another piece measuring 6ft X 17". These two pieces were joined together with a splice plate of 1x4 screwed to both pieces resulting in a fourteen foot long backdrop (Photo 1).



I beefed up the top of the hardboard with a piece of 1x3 screwed along the rear top edge of the backdrop. I installed three pulleys fastened to the moulding just below the crown moulding above the windows, one dead center and one 3" in from both ends of the backdrop. I dropped a plumb bob down from the pulley and marked where the Screw eyes had to be installed in the three locations along the top of the 1x3. I ran nylon rope rated at 110 lbs, which gives me a 3X safety factor, through the pulleys and down to the screw eyes (Photo2). The center pulley and the right pulley are double sheave pulleys. Three Nylon ropes run from the screw eyes through the pulleys and are secured around a 4" cleat screwed to the right-hand end of the window frame. These were bound together with a wire thimble, to keep them together (Photo 3).

Photo 3: A wire thimble binds all three ropes together so that they move in unison when raising the backdrop, keeping it level.

Okay, the backdrop goes up and down, but I needed some security devices to keep the backdrop from crashing down and crushing everything if the ropes slipped or broke. I also needed to keep the hardboard straight along the bottom of the benchwork surface, as well as flat against the window frame along the top. The problem of the backdrop crashing down was solved with some chain secured at each end and slipped over a hook screwed into the moulding near the pulley (Photo 4). To hold the backdrop in place at the bottom, I placed small angle irons along the benchwork surface to hold the hardboard behind and in place. (Photo 5) (caption: angle iron "holders". These will be painted to blend in with scenery when it's finished. To hold the top upright, I screwed hanger bolts into the window frames between each window. When the backdrop is lowered it is pushed back and the hanger bolt protrudes

through a hole in the hardboard and is secured with a wingnut. (Photo 6) Caption: (the hanger bolt for holding the backdrop upright and straight.). Here is the backdrop in it's raised position.(Photo 7). and the backdrop lowered and secured.(Photo 8)

It takes about 1 minute to raise and lower, most of that time is spent installing or removing the wingnuts. It's not a perfect solution, but it suits my needs and budget, and I get to watch the dogs playing in their enclosed yard while shaking my fist and cursing at the squirrels in the bird feeder.

# AUGUST RAILROAD HISTORY AUGUST 28<sup>th</sup>, 1830



Although Peter Cooper's Tom Thumb lost an impromptu race against a horse-drawn carriage after a blower belt failure, the locomotive's initial lead impressed many observers. Captured in this artist's rendering, the event helped accelerate the development of steam engines and railroads in the United States. A replica of this famous locomotive resides in the <u>B&O Railroad Museum</u> in Baltimore, MD.
