Superintendent's Corner

At the Annual Meeting in January, it was decided, due to the anticipated larger than normal attendance to poll those attending on several issues related to their interest in model railroading. So, at the end of the meeting, prior to having lunch, a questionnaire was handed to all who were present so that they could take a few minutes to fill it out. This was intended to be an optional thing to do. I am pleased to report that most of those attending did indeed respond. This included some guests that are not members of the Carolina Southern Division.

The very common question reveled that most respondents modeled in HO scale, followed by N scale (about half

of the HO number). Nearly every other scale/gauge was mentioned. Interest in era preferred to model reflected a near tie between the transition period of steam to diesel (early diesel) vs. the present-day time frame. The rest were scattered from the American Civil War through 1900 into the early 2000's. Most respondents do have a place to run trains, and are members of some sort of model related club or organization besides CSD. All of the model railroad groups that I know of in this area were represented. When asked to name their favorite railroad, there was more variety than I expected! Clearly, NS, CSX, N&W, and Southern were the favorites (surprise?). Yet many others were listed including NKP, Erie, PRR, NYC, Interstate, B&LE, SP, RGS, and ET&WNC(?).

Next, the questionnaire asked what do you like most about model railroading? Here, the answers were rather diverse. I will take the liberty to summarize a bit. Scenery was the most popular answer, followed closely by operating. Building a layout, followed by electronic projects, and scratch building rounded out the topics. When asked slightly differently, electronics (including learning more about DCC and LCC as well as basic layout wiring) was the preferred answer followed by various aspects of scenery building. 3D printing was also mentioned. A few respondents didn't answer this question.

The final question was: Would you be willing to help others? The overwhelming answer was Yes! That is very pleasing for me to hear because I think it is true. When I have been part of a discussion within any gathering of modelers, seldom have I heard a question that does not receive an answer. (Might not always be the best answer, but it is a response).

So, let me close with this. I learned from looking at these questionnaires that those responding to the questions had a variety of answers. Yet, we as a group are mutually interested in the same thing, and are willing to help each other if needed. We need to develop a way to harness that spirit. It will help us all become better modelers, and closer together.

RMU IS BACK!

We started Railroad Modeling University (RMU) 2004, and it has been a signature event for the Division until interrupted by Covid restrictions. RMU is an excellent opportunity to present or attend interesting clinics in all aspects of model railroading. It's also open to the public, giving us a chance to recruit new members to NMRA and the Division. We will start again on Saturday, April 15th, 2023 at West Concord Baptist Church, 225 Warren C. Coleman Blvd., Concord, NC 28027

Tributes to Matt Bumgarner



Among Matt's many contributions:

 Was instrumental in preserving Southern Railway's Newton NC depot, as well as founding the adjacent Southeast Narrow Gauge and Short Line Museum.



- Was an active member of the Alexander Chapter of the NRHS.
- Matt, along with Johnny Graybeal chaired the 31st and 41st National Narrow Gauge Conventions (2011 and 2021) in Hickory.
- Saw to the preservation and restoration of several pieces of ET&WNC including boxcar 434 that was recovered from Allaire State Park in NJ where it had been stored for many years; and was working on ET&WNC motor cars 1 and 2 working to have them restored to operating condition and returning motor car 1 to narrow gauge.
- Also preserved equipment from the Lawndale RR.

- Ran Tar Heel Press, publishing all of Johnny Graybeal's "Along the ET&WNC" series of books and Railroads of Johnson City, along with volumes on the Watauga RR, Lawndale, Carolina and North Western, and Saluda Grade.
- Published Johnny's magazine for the ET&WNCRRHS, "Every Time with No Complaint".
- Worked the coach 5 ticket table at Tweetsie's Heritage Weekend for many years. I've
 had the pleasure of working with him on several occasions.
- Hosted the train (and "dancing girl") shows in Hickory.

I was very pleased to hear that the Life's Celebration held yesterday at the Museum in Matt's honor was was well attended and proved to be a fitting tribute to his contributions. Our condolences to Matt's wife Dawn and his family members. He'll be sorely missed by all of us who knew him. As Ken Riddle is fond of saying, "He's caught the Westbound".

Instructors that taught the same class a number of years may think that they no longer need to teach, but you'd be surprised. All of the classes are popular. Of course, some are more popular than others. But hey, who enjoyed all of their high school and college courses?

Recently prior to the start of a work meeting on the phone the discussion came around to hobbies. I was the only one who said that model trains, is one of my hobbies. One the men on the call said, "You PLAY with model trains?" Notice the word play is in capital letters. That is how he said it. My reply was "No I do not PLAY with model trains. I enjoy and operate model trains as close to reality as the full-size trains." His comeback was that it still sounded like playing to him. I proceeded to give him a quick overview of what operation means in the model railroad world.

Our hobby supports whatever we want to do with our model trains. If we want to watch them run in circles we can do that. If we want to move freight and passengers like the full-size version we can do that. Whatever floats your boat as the saying goes.

I am sure many of you have run into someone that may have said something similar to you as the man in my meeting. Maybe you took issue with it and maybe not. Typically,

the person making the comment has not had the chance to see a layout that supports operation. Now you have an opportunity to let someone in on the fun we have.

The education should not be heavy handed nor should we take on a superior attitude. Instead, it is a wonderful opportunity to help someone understand what we do and why. Hint, Hint, think RMU. They might become a convert to model railroading or support someone in their family that is a model railroader.

There seems to be three type of model railroaders. Let us take a look at each of them. These are my general observations so feel free to disagree.

The Arm Chair. The arm chair model railroader typically does not have any room at all for a layout or even a shelf layout. They support the hobby by subscribing to magazines, purchases books, memorabilia, and other related items. They attend local train shows but usually do not travel out of their local area. They usually do not join a club or the NMRA. For them this enough. They enjoy model railroading.

The Involver. The Involver is the largest segment. They support the hobby by subscribing to magazines, purchases books, memorabilia, rolling stock, locomotives, structures and other related items. They usually have a layout, shelf layout and/or modules. Their layouts/modules are well detailed, look nice and operate well. They attend local train shows and on occasion travel out of their local area to other shows and events. They may join a club, the NMRA or both. When they do join they are active and participate in the club or NMRA activities. They might give a clinic at their club or local NMRA Division. They may run for an office. They enjoy model railroading.

The Rivet Counter. The Rivet Counter is just what the name means. They examine every model, structure, and layout for 100% faithful reproduction of the real world. They are sticklers for details on everything. And I mean everything. They do not know the meaning of "just enough is ok". They support the hobby by subscribing to magazines, purchasing books, memorabilia, rolling stock, locomotives, structures and other related items. Many have layouts that are finely detailed. They usually join a club, the NMRA or both. When they do join they are very active and participate in the club or NMRA activities. They usually give a clinic at their club, local NMRA Division or national show. Many run for an office both locally and within the NMRA. They enjoy model railroading.

Please remember these are generalities from my personal observations. You may see yourself a little in each type. Most people will have one type that dominates their model railroading style. None of them are better than the others as each type benefits our hobby.

Sometimes, The Rivet Counter frustrates The Arm Chair. Sometimes, The Involver frustrates The Rivet Counter, etc. You see where I am going with this? If you are an Arm Chair type embrace The Involver and The Rivet Counter and vice versa. All is good!

The bottom line is our hobby has room for everyone no matter what type of model railroader they are. Welcome all of them with open arms. Embrace them, nurture them and you and they will carry our hobby forward. We all enjoy model railroading.
